A VIEW FROM THE LOFT

Blue Like Jazz

I recently finished reading Don Miller's classic book on modern Christianity, <u>Blue Like Jazz</u>, and wanted to share some of it with you. Don Miller was raised in a fundamentalist tradition and rejected a lot of the things he learned there. He went through a period of disdain and doubt in God before finding a better relationship with the almighty. <u>Blue Like Jazz</u> relates his journey of discovery.

I thoroughly enjoyed <u>Blue Like Jazz</u>, and I have read several others of Don's books. The thesis of the book is best related from the book's opening lines:



"I never liked jazz music because jazz music doesn't resolve. But I was outside the Bagdad Theater in Portland one night when I saw a man playing the saxophone. I stood there for fifteen minutes, and he never opened his eyes. After that I liked jazz music. Sometimes you have to watch somebody love something before you can love it yourself. It is as if they are showing you the way. I used to not like God because God didn't resolve. But that was before I was shown the way..."

One major interesting part of the book is Don's time studying at Reed College in Portland Oregon. For those who don't know, Reed College is infamous for being a place of self-proclaimed, "godless libertines." Though it is a top college academically, it is known for having a high concentration of militant atheists. Don writes about himself and a few of his friends who were some of the only Christians who attended the school. Particularly, Reed College hosts a festival they call, "Ren Fayre" once a year. The campus is shut down so the students can party. Don and his friends decided to have a confessional

booth in the middle of campus during Ren Fayre. However, this wasn't the type of confessional people were expecting. Clearly this idea at face value would likely result in heckling and mockery, but the confessional booth they provided was a sort of reverse confessional: they weren't accepting confessions, they were confessing to the people. They confessed all the things that followers of Jesus have done that aren't very loving. Things like the Crusades, Televangelists, neglecting the poor and the lonely, judging others, etc. The idea actually reached a lot of students, and they managed to open the hearts of several people who were used to viewing Christians as hypocrites. I found the reverse confessional a very creative way of evangelizing and it worked.

Another great point Don makes in the book is about churches and marketing. So many things churches do in America are based on marketing their "product." Don was so disgusted by this in the communities he grew up in that it took him a while to find a place that did its actual duty as a church. Don found this in an independent church called Imago-Dei. Don explains it like this:

"I never thought I'd love church. But here is what I love about (my current church) Imago-Dei. It took me a while to understand that the answer to problems was not marketing or programs but rather spirituality. If we needed to reach youth, we wouldn't do a pizza feed and a game night, we would get together and pray and fast and ask God what to do. God led



some guys to start a homeless teen outreach downtown, and now they feed about one hundred homeless teenagers every week. It is the nuttiest youth group you will ever see, but that is what God said to do. I

love that sort of thing because rather than the church serving itself, the church is serving the lost and lonely. It gives me chills when I think about it because it is a beautiful thing."

These two parts of the book and many others provide great food for thought for churches like Trinity that are trying to find a way to do what Jesus called us to do. I highly recommend the book to anyone who has not read it.

I think Don's jazz metaphor is a great one, not only for relationships with God, but for the church as an organization. Jazz is primarily an improvisational art. It involves a lot of risk. It is about not allowing the "wrong" notes to bother you...or rather about making the "wrong" notes part of the melody, or making them into "right" notes. It's about trying over and over again and allowing the process of trial and error to be part of the music, not a pathway to it. In this way, I think Don (who is not a musician) hit on some points without even knowing it. I do think the church needs to be blue like jazz. Let's keep trying and make our mistakes into part of God's song. -Nicholas Carroll, Director of Music

A few of Deb Stewart's Highlights from Synod Assembly - Plans for REFORMATION 500:

- A Reformation Festival—Saturday, October 14, 2017 at Legion Park, Hollidaysburg. An afternoon of music, food, and fellowship culminating with dinner followed by an outdoor service led by Bishop Rhyne.
- Reformation Sunday, October 29 at First Lutheran Church, Altoona at 3:00 p.m. Rostered leaders are invited to vest and process; color of the day is red!
- Reformation Day Prayer Liturgies: Gatherings may take place in several conferences and congregations on Tuesday, October 31 to pray for next 500 years, to bring Christians closer.
- Wittenberg Reformation Tree: On May 29, 2017 a tree was planted in Wittenberg and a sister tree planted at the Synod Office on May 30, 2017, by the Allegheny Synod. (Part of a large park in Wittenberg, in the shape of the Luther Rose.)

The Bishop and several other folks were headed to Montana soon after the conven-

tion to help build a new Mission house for our sister synod. Pastor John Telyec is developing an outreach for folks who are deaf and use sign language as their primary language. The Synod Council is developing a strategic



plan for our future. All in all, there will be some excitement ahead for the Allegheny Synod.

Even the work of the Assembly (adopting the budget, filling committee vacancies, etc.) had its own excitement when the fire alarm went off! It was just a malfunctioning sensor (maybe too much hot air?) but it certainly got us up and moving. The other thing that got us moving was the rousing worship service by the Sequanota staff on Saturday morning.

Here's a fun fact from a presentation at Synod to wrap up my report. In 2000, the Arts and Entertainment Network (A&E) did a show on the most influential people of the last 1,000 years. Martin Luther was #3 on their list!



RECAP OF INCOME & EXPENSES



WELCA TRIENNIAL GATHERING



"All Anew"

St. Paul's theme, "In Christ we are all Anew" was explored in many ways at the Women of the ELCA's Gathering in Minneapolis, Minnesota in July. Women numbering 3,300 from throughout the U.S. with many special guests from around the world, gathered together for Worship, Presentations, Workshops, Movie Premiers, Concerts, Physical Activities, Reunions, Friendship formation, Conversations, and Sharing!

Five women (three members of Trinity and two friends) enjoyed a road trip that took 8 days --- from Somerset to Columbus to Chicago to Minneapolis to Mt. Pleasant (Wisconsin) to Columbus and back to Somerset! On our way to the event, we stopped in to see the ELCA Church Offices in Chicago. We enjoyed a tour throughout the building and the amazing collection of religious art throughout the building! (Pictures are posted on Facebook!) We met "our" church staff in the Presiding Bishop's office and the Global Mission offices – one highlight of our trip!

Pastor Linda's mother, Rhoda, and her friend, Bonnie, joined us for much of the event. We tasted food from all over the world: Indian, Greek, British, and enjoyed the delicious hospitality of Minnesota! Our first night in Minneapolis was an evening of Jazz music -- and some of us attended a Singalong concert with the Lutheran Choir, too. Flor and I took a bike tour of the outdoor Sculpture Garden, a few blocks from the hotel, and Liz participated in the Run, Walk, and Roll.

Worship with 3,000 of your new "best friends" is awesome, with music from all over the world - but the Preachers and

Speakers raised the roof! Bishop Eaton preached at opening worship and Rev. Angela Khabeb brought down the house, with a rousing closing sermon. The youngest in our group: Flor, Liz and Makayla attended a special evening gathering of those born in the 70's, 80's and 90's – and were warmly welcomed throughout the event. Flor attended the multicultural gathering, meeting Lutheran women from all over the world.

Our Bible Study leader was Kelly Fryer, (a former Lutheran pastor who wrote the Bible Study in the summer GATHER magazine) who challenged all of us to "say goodbye to 'nice'" and embrace God's Call to do real GOOD in the world. 'Nice' allows injustice to flourish in an atmosphere where no one wants to rock the boat, but followers of Jesus are not called to be 'nice' but instead, to do GOOD – and that may very well raise a stir.

Nobel Prize Winner, Leymah Gbowee of Liberia challenged us with "With whom is God asking us to Align today?" She began a movement where women were gathered to pray in the streets of Liberia, eventually putting an end to that country's civil war and worked to reconcile warring factions. Today she works for the education of young women, particularly young girls who otherwise would have a bleak future. She continues her activist role in her home country and inspires women around the world to arm themselves with prayer then go out to change the world.

The Rev. Alexia Salvatierra spoke about our country's struggle with poverty, immigration, and the justice system. She shared her observations about Biblical characters who "upended the tables" in their time, and she challenged us to confront injustices in our own communities.

Each of the women in our group attended workshops and seminars of their own choosing. We are sharing what we learned in Sunday School classes this summer and fall. It was an inspiring and challenging event for all of us! On our way home, we stopped in to visit with one of Pastor Linda's former supervisors, Pastor Nancy Eggert, who welcomed us at her home on Lake Michigan – a restful stop for weary travelers. Our morning wake-up call came from three baby eagles in a nest outside the house – and our breakfast included watching Mom and Dad eagle deliver fish to their brood! We returned home exhausted but also enlivened by the trip.

We are grateful for all the support provided by members of Trinity – for the special financial gifts, for the fund raiser participation, and for all the prayers. Our hope is that others will come along in the future! The 2020 Triennial is planned for Phoenix, Arizona!

Notes from a Workshop by Deb Stewart

SABBATH REST

Genesis describes that on the 6th day God saw all that he had made, thought it was good, *and rested*. Among the Ten Commandments, the third is "Honor the Sabbath and keep it Holy." There is even a penalty for not obeying the Sabbath in Numbers 15:32-36.

Yet, Do we give ourselves permission to rest, in our 24/7 Culture? Sunday is our Sabbath, but for many, it is a work day. Sabbath is not fit for labor, but fit for life. Sabbath is for the RESURRECTION OF OUR SOUL:

R = **Relinquish** say Yes to Sabbath; let go of all other

commitments

R = **Refrain** from work

R = **Relieve** mind and body of other concerns

R = **Return** to God our source

R = **Reminder** of who we are

R = **Redirect** energies

R = **Remember** what you have been given— it is enough

—the good things

R = **Receiving** Grace—God's word

R = Replenish—Restore—Refresh

R = **Regular rituals** Create rituals that rest

R = **Rhythm of life** Sabbath is long enough to give new clarity.

The 500th Anniversary of the Reformation presents a good opportunity to explore some of the essentials of our <u>Reformation History and Lutheran Theology</u>. Several of our Sunday School Leaders have expertise or interest in particular themes, and this emphasis will allow them an opportunity to shine! Check your bulletin for upcoming dates.

<u>Declaration on the Way: Church, Ministry and Eucharist</u> is a resource developed for discussions between Roman Catholics and Lutherans. The material explains areas of agreement, convergence and divergence between our churches. It provides insights gained over 50 years of Ecumenical Dialogues and will lead us through conversations with our Roman Catholic neighbors about issues that challenge our faith today. Do you want to be involved? Speak to Pastor Linda so that the conversations will be held on a timeframe you can attend!

Also, this fall, we will focus on God's Gift of <u>WATER</u> for several sessions in Sunday School. We will Raise Awareness about issues relating to Water Ecology, Economics, and explore local challenges to clean water and what we can do.

Space is limited so please call. Your check (made out to Friedens Lutheran Church) is your reservation.


