The Eucharist and Challenges in the

Contemporary Context

The 2017 Trinity Lay School of Theology is scheduled for March 25th (snow/ice day: April 1). In keeping with our yearlong preparations for the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, we are looking at aspects of our faith tradition as outlined in Luther's Small Catechism. <u>Holy Com-</u> <u>munion</u> will be our topic at the Lay School of Theology, our day of learning with a theological scholar – in our own hometown!

The Morning sessions will be: The Eucharist and the Reformation beginning at 9:00 a.m. The Afternoon sessions will look at Challenges in Contemporary Cultural Contexts and begin at 12:30 p.m. Holy Communion is central to the church's life together. In this meal we receive forgiveness of sin, food for faith, fellowship of the saints, and a commission to go out and share bread for the hungry. What did it mean at the time of the Reformation? How did Luther's Reformation Theology change the church's experience of this sacred meal?

Given our current context, for example, a population that increasingly does not know about scripture, Jesus' story, or

the meaning behind our rituals -- What does it mean to welcome others to the Table of Grace? What does Eucharistic Hospitality mean in our changing culture or when we travel or visit with other cultures? Come and learn! Come and ask questions!

Our guest presenter is The Rev. Dr. J. Jayakiran Sebastian who is Dean of the Seminary and H. George Anderson Professor of Mission and Cultures at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. He is a Presbyter of the Church of South India and has been Professor in the Department of Theology and Ethics at the United Theological College in Bangalore, India. He is the author of



Enlivening the Past: An Asian Theologian's Engagement with the Early Teachers of Faith.

He and his wife, Dr. Mrinalini Sebastian are excited to be coming to a congregation that Father Heyer served (twice) as Pastor, in the 1820's and 1830's. Father Heyer is known throughout India as the missionary that not only planted Lutheran Churches, but also returned to India to serve as a medical doctor – so great was his compassion for the people of India and their need for Healing ministries. You will be inspired to meet the Sebastian's and hear about Father Heyer from them!

VIEW FROM THE LOFT

The Singing Church

Over the years, the Lutheran Church has gained the nickname, "The Singing Church." Indeed, whenever I'm around my fellow Music Directors who belong to other faith traditions, I often hear these words used on me. At university, I studied with a Presbyterian Organist, a Catholic Organist, and a Lutheran Choir Director. The Presbyterian would look over the liturgies I was learning to play and say, "You Lutherans have SO much music!" The Catholic would often comment, "Since you Lutherans do all the verses and play such grand hymnody, you'll have to learn more organ registration than the rest of my students." (Registration is the art of choosing

which organ stops to use to make each stanza different and interesting.) The Lutheran would often say, "We are the singing church and don't you forget it. Don't be tempted to start using soloists all the time... make the PEOPLE sing."



Obviously, these teachings have had an influence on my own philosophy, and I've always felt that even though it is certainly more work, it is a proud title to be known as "The Singing Church." Luther himself certainly often wrote of how important music was but it's not JUST music that's important, it's the participation. Just as Luther felt all congregants should be able to read the Bible in their native tongue, they should also be able to sing in it. Luther often quoted St. Paul's letter to the Colossians, "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom; teaching and admonishing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord." [Colossians 3:16]

How can we maintain our identity as a singing church in the modern era? Train yourself to listen to the words and the message of the hymns. The hymns chosen for each service are chosen to match the theme of the lectionary. Pay attention to how the central theme of the hymn fits the readings. Seeing these connections brings more understanding of the Scriptures, hymns, and sermon. Each hymn we sing is a wonderful opportunity to confess our faith to God and our neighbors. It doesn't matter if you think you're tone deaf, what matters is the words; the beauty is in the proclamation of the Gospel. If you're really a bad singer, the people near you will just have to sing louder. One of the great things about having an awesome pipe organ like we do at Trinity is that it coaxes the congregants to sing louder! Be bold!

We have inherited an amazing responsibility as "The Singing Church." This 500th anniversary year of the reformation, remember our title each Sunday as you cast aside your inhibitions and make a joyful noise! Ask yourself, do you really think the German peasants from the 1520's were any better singers? Forget your stumbling blocks and sing!

SEDER MEAL

You Are Invíted to a Passover Seder Meal Saturday, Apríl 8 - 5:00 p.m.

The Seder Meal is part of the present-day Jewish Passover celebration. In the meal, our Jewish friends recall how God, through Moses, led the Israelites out of slavery into freedom. Due to the sacrifice of a pure and spotless lamb, whose blood marked every Jewish home, the angel of death "Passed Over." The Seder recalls God's mighty acts of deliverance and fulfills the command by God that all Jewish families remember this event annually at a gathering around the family table.

For Christians, it is a doorway, to enter into the world of the Jewish faith today, and gives us a language to describe what God has done for us in Jesus. The Seder meal and the Passover Celebration is a thoroughly Jewish tradition, not our own. We are privileged to welcome my dear friend, Glenn Siegal, with his family, for our gathering. Glenn will narrate and act as the primary host of the Seder meal. We will gather at "family tables" where people at each table will act as father, mother, and one of several children.

Pesach (pay-sak) – Passover - takes place in a Jewish home each year. The home is carefully cleaned and scrubbed, cooking vessels are made kosher, and all chametz (especially any leavened bread) is removed

from the home. Some foods are forbidden during Passover; other foods must be "kosher" – prepared properly, in keeping with Jewish tradition.

Our Seder meal will include rituals and foods used

by Jewish families at this celebration to commemorate the mighty acts of God. At our tables, there will be bitter herbs

(for the harshness of slave labor); salt water (for the tears shed); Charoset (apples, walnuts, and cinnamon); a goblet for Elijah, ten drops of wine for the 10 plagues; matzah (unleavened bread); glasses of wine; and much more. In addition, a full dinner will be served to include: matzah ball soup, roasted lamb, roasted chicken, roasted potatoes, sweet potatoes, green beans, and traditional desserts.

Come and join in this Seder meal as part of your preparation for Holy Week. It will deepen your understanding of the Jewish tradition, enlighten your Christian faith, and it will be a time for us to gather to pray for freedom and peace throughout the world. Bring your family and invite your friends. The Passover Meal is traditionally a time to invite others to the table! Elementary School and especially CONFIRMATION STUDENTS are invited, along with their families, if at all possible.

Please call Trinity's Office (445-5446) to reserve your place at the table! IF YOU are able to help "host" a table by providing a linen tablecloth and napkins, wine glasses, and candlesticks, OR if you can help by preparing a special (simple) dish, let us know! Recipes will be available in Trinity's Office. I would be happy to answer any questions you might have (289-3140). A freewill offering will be taken to help cover the costs of the meal – your generosity is appreciated!

Although the books are not to "sign out" in the conventional library way, you may examine them when you visit the art center. Sign the log for a particular volume or two and find a quiet place to peruse the contents. You will discover a wide range of topics and acquire a deeper, broader definition for Papercutting. Among the

books, you will find subjects that include: early Pennsylvania German Fraktur, traditional Jewish papercuttings, colorful Polish forms, contemporary American and European examples, and, yes, even steps for variations of cut paper, like snowflakes.

Whether you think of papercutting as a craft or as an expressive, graphic art form, the books will allow you to connect with other cultures and to learn more about the history of the art. Because using paper as a medium and a blade as a tool is a way to experiment creatively and inexpensively, you might even want to try your hand at it. Add your name and interest to a class list in the Laurel Arts office for a future introductory session. Papercutting is a subject worth investigating at any age. Its techniques, tools, and approaches are as varied as the people who work with the art form. Like other art pursuits, one can develop more confidence and skills with practice. Since "no one's you-er than you," your own projects will be reflections of your personality and experiences.

So, open the books, look between the covers, consider the papercuttings in the Guild of American Papercutters Museum, and then interact with the medium. As it speaks to you, you may surprise yourself discovering papercutting is a fascinating pursuit.



THE SEASON OF LENT

The Season of Lent is a time set aside for self-examination, for repentance from everything that draws us away from God, and is a time for picking up new habits of faith. The Lenten Disciplines of prayer, study of Scripture, almsgiving, and service are intended to help us adopt new practices that we will continue after the season is over. We are an Easter people all year round, but in this season, we are intended to rediscover the basics of faithful living.

Trinity offers an array of events intended to help us form new practices or learn more about those we already do regularly:

- The Lenten Devotional helps us to look at parts of Luther's Catechism each day.
- Lay School of Theology on March 25th is focused on Holv Communion.
- Adult Sunday School is focused on the scripture stories of Lent and Easter.
- A Seder Meal on Saturday, April 8th will help us hear the central story of the Jewish faith - Jesus' faith.
- Holy Week services: Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday at 7 AM in the Chapel; Thursday, Friday, and Saturday at 7 p.m. in the Nave.

We will walk with Jesus through his last days...from Palm Sunday to Good Friday's Crucifixion, to Easter's Resurrection.

WHAT IS EASTER?

Easter is the sacred celebration of Christ's resurrection from the dead. It is the oldest and holiest Christian festival, the climax and center of the liturcical year, and the holy day to which all other holy CHRIST days point. Even denominations that do not strictly IS RISEN follow a liturgical calendar commemorate Easter with tremendous joy and thanksgiving.



WHAT ARE THE GREAT FIFTY DAYS



Contrary to what many people think, Easter is not a single day. It is actually a season that begins on Easter Sunday and continues for seven full weeks. This seven-week cycle is known historically as the Great Fifty Days or

the Week of Weeks. During this time, the church celebrates the Lord's resurrection, His appearances to the disciples after Easter, His post-resurrection teachings, His ascension into heaven, and the disciples' eager anticipation of the coming of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. Ascension Day-the 40th of the Great Fifty Days—is frequently commemorated with a special evening worship service since it always falls on a Thursday.




