The same is true as we consider our forefathers and foremothers in the Lutheran Reformation. We only know what has been passed down to us. ADULT SUNDAY SCHOOL

In November, we continue to explore the Reformation and its impact, not only on theology and the church but for life in community, language, education, and more!

In December, we look at the texts for the season of Advent and begin our study of the Gospel of Mark!

VIEW FROM THE LOFT

Selah

One of the great mysteries of the Bible is the word *Selah*. It occurs 71 times in Psalms, and 3 times in Habakkuk. Its exact meaning has been theorized by biblical scholars for ages. As a musician, some of the theories have always fascinated me.

Many of the Psalms were sung accompanied by musical instruments, and there are references to this in many chapters. Thirty-one of the thirty-nine psalms with the caption, "To the choir-master" include the word *selah*. It is often suggested that *selah* may indicate a break in the song whose purpose is similar to that of Amen ("so be it") in that it stresses the truth and importance of the preceding passage.

One common theory supposes that the word is a musical instruction similar to the Italian word "forte" meaning loud. This would possibly be to emphasize the text by also raising the volume of the musical accompaniment and perhaps indicate a cymbal crash. This theory came about because one root part of the Hebrew script for selah means "lift up." This theory has been debated because many instances of the word selah come at the end of a Psalm. Some have argued that many Psalms were meant to be performed one after another in a set, like movements of a Sonata, and therefore, it would still make sense to have it listed at the end of a Psalm. It still doesn't make much sense though.

Another theory, assuming *Selah* is a musical term, believed it could indicate a tempo change from fast to slow or slow to fast. The issue with this theory is that there is no

indicator of which is which or what starting tempo each piece would have making a relative change an irrelevant descriptor. Others have theorized that *selah* indicated the singer was to wait to begin the next stanza or verse for a musical interlude, with the interlude giving the listen-

ers time to reflect on the meaning of the words they had just heard.

Another possibility is that *Selah* meant to repeat a section of the music like a refrain. This would be like the Psalm tones used in our "Celebrate" insert which have a line repeated at certain intervals for emphasis of the main theme. The issue with this theory is that no "refrain" or part to repeat is indicated, unless it would have simply meant repeating the previous line or stanza like a repeat sign in western music notation.

Some view *selah* as simply an instruction to the liturgist (or person reading/reciting the passage) to pause for a moment of silence and emphasis.

In my view it is most likely true that *selah* was a musical term since it only occurs in scripture in places where music would have been used. There are other songs in the Bible that don't contain *selah*, such as Mary's "Magnificat." This could be due to several reasons, the most obvious being that the Psalmists were trained musicians and Mary was not. It is much more likely David would have indicated a musical term and Mary would not. Another possibility is that by Mary's time, the word was no longer being used. There are records of even ancient Greek Biblical scholars debating the meaning of the word *selah*, so it is possible that Mary and Jews of her time would not have known what it meant either.

The meaning of *selah* is certainly a good example of, "God only knows." All I know is when people ask, "If you could ask God one thing what would it be?" I am certainly tempted to respond, "What does *selah mean*?"







BEQUEST RECEIVED LOIS COUNTRYMAN ESTATE

Trinity has received a bequest of more than \$38,000 from the Estate of Lois Countryman. A gift to the church is a person's final word of witness and thanksgiving to God. Trinity is grateful for Lois's love for her church. The bequest will be used both to fund Trinity's missions in 2017 and to enrich Trinity's Endowment Fund which provides for future ministry endeavors.

The Endowment Fund is meant to exist in perpetuity, with the principle invested and preserved, while only the iinterest and dividends are available for spending. This income provides money that has been used in the past to work on Capital Improvement projects (breezeway wall; kitchen gas line, pave driveway, new sound system); to provide funding for our Vicars; to respond to needs of local ministries not budgeted (Somerset Community Clinic); and gives the Council funds that can be used to invest in new ministry projects (or new ministers - recently, the Endowment interest was used as a kick-starter gift for Carlton Jacobson at Seminary!)

Trinity's Endowment Fund, because of the generosity of congregation members, and wise investment decisions, continues to grow. As the fund grows, dividends and interest annually generated are made available to Council for Social Ministry and Mission, Program Ministry, Facilities Fund, and Undesignated projects.

Have you included Trinity in your will?

From the fund's founding document: "We believe as Christian stewards we are responsible for all God has given us....our time, our talent, and our treasure. We believe we are to share these gifts so that the Gospel message of God's gracious love and forgiveness can be made known to all people."

500th Anniversary of the Reformation

"For we hold that a person is justified by faith apart from works prescribed by the law"—Romans 3:28

The heart of Martin Luther's work was the understanding that we are not saved by our own power or ability. Our salvation is a gift from God. In God's tender compassion, Christ Jesus comes to save us from the powers of sin, death, and the devil. We will never be good enough to earn or deserve the gifts of forgiveness, eternal life, and life with God that we receive in Jesus Christ. Nevertheless, Christ came because God loves us and would not abandon us to destruction. Salvation isn't about us. It's all about Jesus.

Like many of his time, the young Luther didn't understand this idea of the free gift of life in Jesus Christ. He believed that there was a very high bar to jump over in order to earn the salvation of Christ. It was common in Luther's day for preachers to try to scare people into behaving by telling them how bad they were and how short they fell from what God wanted for them. This type of preaching led people to think that salvation was something that they had to accomplish.

While he studied Holy Scripture, Luther rediscovered what the Apostle Paul wrote in his letter to the Romans (3:28) and his heart was opened. Paul reminded Luther—and us—that it is God who makes us right through faith which is a gift to us through the Holy Spirit.

Since our salvation is secured in and through Jesus, then what are we supposed to do? Luther tells us that we are still to do good works, and we are still to love our neighbor. However, we do not do good works and good deeds SO THAT God will love us. We do good works, good deeds, acts of mercy, and works of justice BECAUSE God first loved us in Jesus Christ. We love and care for our neighbor because the Holy Spirit is leading and guiding us to do so. So, Luther would argue, don't sit around worrying about your salvation; get out there and start helping your neighbor.

What Luther learned, and teaches us, is that Jesus Christ is the great gift that changes, forms, and reforms us. Jesus is the one who chose in his mercy to save us from sin, death, and the devil. Now Jesus, through the power of the Holy Spirit, is continuing to work in this world and inviting you and me into that work of loving and caring for all people.

The Reformation calls us to re-center our lives in Christ. We are called and led by God to be a blessing to others. All of this is possible because of what Jesus Christ has done and will continue to do. For that we can say – thanks be to God.

May you continue to be re-formed to share Christ's love in the world, and may God be with you on this Reformation Sunday.
