FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

Oh God, "you have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless. until they find rest in you." - St. Augustine



Grace and Peace to all of you!

Despite his mother's prayers for many years, that he would respond to God's Love in Jesus Christ, the man we know now as St. Augustine spent most of his younger years in a desperate search for fulfillment: excessive pleasures, false religions, philosophy, and many distractions. Finally, he came to the point of asking: "How long, O Lord, how long?" After that cry, the Lord led him to a passage in Romans... convicted him of his need for Christ and he was baptized. He became a great theologian in the early church.

A decade later, he recorded his faith journey in a unique autobiography called "The Confessions" - it was the testimony of a soul that had finally found rest in its Creator. "You have made us for yourself, and our hearts are restless, until they can find rest in you." (Thank you to Dan Graves for this abbreviated biography.)

I suspect there are many of us who, like Augustine, spend a lot of time and energy searching for fulfillment in the goals we have set for ourselves. All too often, we don't obtain them - or even if we do, we find them lacking. We aren't satisfied. It is no surprise that I would say that is because we are, as the song says, "Looking for LOVE in all the wrong places." We are like puzzle pieces, each of us shaped and fashioned differently from one another, and each of us part of God's big

picture. But we are not "at home" until we find our place in God – like the satisfaction that comes from finding the place that "fits" as if we have been "made for it."

I believe that also refers to finding our "place" in the Body of Christ in the world – the church! I am a respecter of the many different churches available to choose from in our community and in our world. For a time, we might find our best "fit" in one tradition, but later, find that it no longer fits as well. It may be that our life circumstances dictate being active in one faith community when our children are young, but at another time in our life, another community fits a bit better... and then, sometimes we are torn between communities we love. All of these scenarios are uncomfortable.

I respect an honest struggle when folks are sensing a change is needed - and I pray for them. When our family in faith experiences conflict or a change in pastoral leadership, folks look for a quiet and safe harbor in the storm. When folks come to Trinity in that circumstance, I encourage them to stay awhile, be refreshed, but to return to their family of faith when they are strengthened, not to avoid the challenges of community life. The same is true, I hope, when folks are conflicted about what is happening at Trinity and seek refuge elsewhere for awhile.

I HOPE and PRAY that folks will HONESTLY wrestle with their concerns...and NOT escape dealing with them...that they will keep communications and relationships open and work for a resolution. "Silently" or not so silently slipping off to another church is not helpful – for us individually or for community life. For the community we leave, it feels like "the silent treatment" or rejection; it sows seeds of discontent and

doubt about the love we felt for one another, the fellowship we enjoyed. And the one who leaves without saying a word misses an opportunity to grow, to forgive, or to be genuine.

Our life together is a delicate ecosystem, and changes can be disruptive. One of our dear elder members used to tell me, "My church has changed!" Yes. This is true. We miss our friends who have died or moved, the liturgy or hymnody we grew up with, the preacher we loved – we miss the "fit" and "comfort" we used to know.

It may be helpful to remember that our TRUE LIFE is found in Jesus alone, and no human community is a perfect

fit for anyone. The perfect fit is found in God, alone. So, if you feel that something is missing – Go first, to the One who has made

you, named you, and claimed you. PRAY for discernment, then, talk with your brothers and sisters in faith. Try to be patient in our life together and consider the challenges we face as opportunities to fashion us more and more into the community that God desires.

Let's remember too, that there are many of our neighbors who have been seeking fulfillment and have only found disappointment – some have been "looking for Love in all the wrong places." Some have been hit hard with losses and disappointments. Here, at Trinity, we proclaim the God who cares so much for the lost and grieving, that he sent his Son... we proclaim Him among us each and every Sunday morning for our "happy hour" of worship... we listen for His Word for us in Worship and our wide variety of Education classes, we celebrate His presence in our Fellowship and Service opportunities. We grow in faith together.

VIEW FROM THE LOFT

CHRISTIAN EDM (ELECTRONIC DANCE MUSIC):
THE NEW CHRISTIAN CONTEMPORARY?

There is no debating that the rapid spread of technology has changed our world. Most of us are only beginning to notice just how profoundly the technological renaissance has changed our lifestyles. One area that has changed meteorically is, of course, music. To delve fully into the effects of these changes could fill a book, possibly even multiple volumes of thick books, so I will be brief here attempting to focus on technology's effects on Christian music in a very barebones way.

To understand technology's effect on music, we must first learn about some terms, without which we cannot understand the topic. Technology and the people using it *love* acronyms. The first we need to know is EDM, or



"Electronic Dance Music." This is music made solely on a computer using no "real" instruments. EDM is focused on providing a song or "track" to dance to; as such the core of the song is the "four-on-the-floor" drum beat. It takes no musical study or ability to make, but requires only rudimentary knowledge of song structure and a computer with the proper programs. Another term to know is DAW, or "Digital Audio Workstation." This is a computer program used to create digital music. DAW's have existed for a long time, but used to be so expensive that only very successful musicians had access to their capabilities (think Michael Jackson types). Today DAW's are readily available and anyone with a laptop and the desire can make "professional" sounding tracks recorded using our next term, VST's. A VST or "Virtual Studio Technology" is the way a DAW makes your computer into a

real life recording studio. For example, it used to be that you required a stack of "electronic boxes with dials" (such as compressors) to implement pitch correction onto a vocalist. Now using VST, anyone with a DAW can make themselves sing perfectly on pitch without taking a trip to Abbey Road or having to sing multiple "takes." Using MIDI, or Musical Instrument Digital Interface, a person can directly record from an electric piano keyboard a song that could then be played by a computer using samples of Virtual Instruments. (VI's are studio-recorded samples of real actual acoustic instruments packaged on a hard drive to make the basic keyboard sound like any other instrument.) This is a great method for someone like me to record because the quality of the sample from a VI is much better than if I used a microphone and my piano as it eliminates all background noise and gives me the benefit of very expensive pianos and microphones without having to own them. However, in recent times MIDI has fallen to the side in favor of loops and sampling programs. These programs allow a person to play common chord progressing without knowing anything about those chords or how to play them by simply pressing a computer key. In fact, Sony has created an AI (Artificial Intelligence) that can "write" pop songs after analyzing song structure. This has all contributed to the rise of the "Age of the DJ."

In Christian Contemporary music, it was long "cool" to make it clear that Christian music could be played on popular mediums such as electric guitars, basses, and drum sets with the Praise Leaders being akin to rock stars. Today, the difference is: rock stars are no longer "rock stars" in secular culture. For example, in 2016 the highest earning musician was likely Calvin Harris, a DJ who earned around \$67 million playing "raves" and "dance parties" alone (EDM does not use the word concert). Comparatively, Bruce Springsteen, one of the most popular rock concert tours of the year, made

about \$60 million. Keep in mind Bruce Springsteen is 67 and Calvin Harris is 32. Springsteen is a well-respected guitar player who began playing guitar at age 7 and developed his skills over a lifetime. Harris began "making demo tracks" in his bedroom at age 18 on his computer. I don't mean to criticize EDM and computer music itself but simply point out that it takes much less skill to earn much more than a traditional musician.

For me the key of any art, especially music, is the human element - the self-expression of the musician, the composer.

This is often lost in music that is made solely



on computer algorithms. However, its popularity has influenced sacred music. There are many Christian EDM tracks and even Christian Worship that involves a EDM "rave" or "dance party." Some examples are DJ Disciples, Salt of Sound, Raze, World Wide Message Tribe, Mad at the World, Guvna B, and many more.

Those who haven't heard EDM might not know that many EDM tracks do not have lyrics, and if they do they are very basic. For example the lyrics to World Wide Message Tribe's track, "The Real Thing:"

How does this type of music change the dynamic of selfexpression through music? Is there a place for this type of music in worship? The answers to these questions obviously depend on the individual, however objectively it seems that the tie to the word of God is lost with no lyrics or overly simplistic lyrics. The most important thing to remember is that the world and especially the way we make music is always changing and God's church must be aware of the trends. Many people are threatened with the notion that computers can play music perfectly instantly that would take a human years and years to master. However, if we know innately that the "human" element of music, the self-expression is what really makes music meaningful, I don't believe computers will be replacing us in the world or worship anytime soon. Computer music actually makes us more aware of the need for a human element. I'll leave you with a quote from one of my favorite bands, "Rush." In their song, "The Spirit of the Radio," they state:

"All this machinery
Making modern music
Can still be open-hearted
Not so coldly charted
It's really just a question
Of your honesty, yeah your honesty"

LENT

The term LENT comes from "Lengthen" and refers to the lengthening of the day throughout this Season. We move from Darkness to Light (the theme you will hear in Wednesday evening services.) We move from little knowledge of God, to God revealed in the life and death and resurrection of Jesus. We journey from the mountain top of the Transfiguration to the valley of death during Holy Week, then to the Garden in grief and in the Joy of the Resurrection.





The Eucharist and the Reformation and The Eucharist and Challenges in the Contemporary Context

The 2017 Trinity Lay School of Theology is scheduled for March 25th (snow/ice day: April 1). In keeping with our yearlong preparations for the celebration of the 500th Anniversary of the Reformation, we are looking at aspects of our faith tradition as outlined in Luther's Small Catechism. Holy Communion will be our topic at the Lay School of Theology, our day of learning with a theological scholar – in our own hometown!

The Morning sessions will be: The Eucharist and the Reformation beginning at 9:00 a.m. The Afternoon sessions will look at Challenges in Contemporary Cultural Contexts and begin at 12:30 p.m. Holy Communion is central to the church's life together. In this meal we receive forgiveness of sin, food for faith, fellowship of the saints, and a commission to go out and share bread for the hungry. What did it mean at the time of the Reformation? How did Luther's Reformation Theology change the church's experience of this sacred meal?

Given our current context, for example, a population that increasingly does not know about scripture, Jesus' story, or

the meaning behind our rituals -- What does it mean to welcome others to the Table of Grace? What does Eucharistic Hospitality mean in our changing culture or when we travel or visit with other cultures? Come and learn! Come and ask questions!

Our guest presenter is The Rev. Dr. J. Jayakiran Sebastian who is Dean of the Seminary and H. George Anderson Professor of Mission and Cultures at the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Philadelphia. He is a Presbyter of the Church of South India and has been Professor in the Department of Theology and Ethics at the United Theological College in Bangalore, India. He is the author of



Enlivening the Past: An Asian Theologian's Engagement with the Early Teachers of Faith.

He and his wife, Dr. Mrinalini Sebastian are excited to be coming to a congregation that Father Heyer served (twice) as Pastor, in the 1820's and 1830's. Father Heyer is known throughout India as the missionary that not only planted Lutheran Churches, but also returned to India to serve as a medical doctor – so great was his compassion for the people of India and their need for Healing ministries. You will be inspired to meet the Sebastian's and hear about Father Heyer from them!

CAMP SEQUANOTA CAPITAL CAMPAIGN UPDATE

As you will remember, two years ago, we publicized the Capital Campaign for Camp Sequanota to raise money for capital improvements. Our congregation made a commitment to this campaign of \$5,000 for 3 years for a total of \$15,000. In order to meet our goal, I am asking that you consider making a contribution this winter/spring to the Camp Sequanota Capital Campaign in order that we as a congregation may meet our goal.

Some of the capital improvements made to the Camp so far are: substantial renovation and update of the swimming pool. It has received a new filter system; the asphalt ring around the top of the pool has been replaced; and it has had a handicap accessible platform installed including stairs and a chair to lower folks into the pool who need that assistance. New water lines have been installed. The newly renovated pool will be up and ready to go this spring with renovations that cost approximately \$350,000.00. Renovations to the Dining Hall included painting the interior, replacing appliances in the kitchen such as the walkin freezer, dishwasher, griddle, and ice maker. The Bowersox Center has had a new coat of paint throughout as well as new furniture installed, and the entrance area is being renovated.


