I am just now recovering from all the events of Holy Week... getting my first regular day off this week, since a month ago. That may surprise some of you - no doubt you have heard something like this:

"A pastor only works for an hour on Sunday morning...so, what do they DO the rest of the week?" - That is a good question! It deserves a good answer! After all, we ALL pay the Pastor a lot of money!

My first reaction is to ask, "Would you join me for a day or two... you know, a ride-along!" First, because I would love the company (a lot of my work is done alone - and sometimes it is really quite lonely.) Secondly, I would LOVE to share what I do with many of you - because I am representing YOU, the Body of Christ in just about everything that I do as Pastor!

When I first met with Trinity's Congregational Council back in late October of 2004, the subject of how I would be using my time was of particular interest to a few folks on the Council. I got the feeling that folks didn't trust their pastoral leadership. Accountability seemed to be a big concern. So I promised the Council that I would create a schedule each week. with the meetings, appointments, and the periods of time I would be open for visits. Further, I would post that schedule on the door of the Pastor's Office, so that folks could stop in and see for themselves, what I was doing, if I wasn't in the office.

Fourteen years later, I still post my schedule. For privacy, I don't generally include the names of folks I am visiting or the reason – but visitation is a big part of my weekly work. Sometimes those visits are scheduled ahead of time, sometimes they are "filled in" as I become aware of the need – hospitalizations and deaths, for example. I meet with folks who are anxious about caring for elderly parents, upcoming surgeries, upset with their ex's, frightened for their children, or facing life changing decisions. So you will also see blanks on my schedule – be assured, they are generally full by the end of the week – and so is my heart! Great are the burdens so many folks carry!

I agree that Accountability is important....but of course, that goes both ways! You should know what I am doing – but there is a Ministry Partnership here, and YOU are a part of that equation too! So some of my weekly work is meeting with members who have expressed an interest in participating in one of our ministries. I train folks to be Communion Assistants or Eucharistic Ministers, to help in Sunday School, or make visits at the homes and nursing facilities. Matching spiritual gifts and interests to our various ministries is part of my work each week. The sign on my office door says "Equipper of the Saints for Ministry." That isn't just a slogan, it is the calling of every pastor! I take it seriously – as each of us are given gifts to share, and we find our joy when we are doing the work that God calls us to do, in building up the Body of Christ!



Of course, Scripture and Bible Studies are an important part of my work. I prepare for the Monday Morning Bible Study, the Marys and Marthas Bible Study, and for our Sunday morning Sunday School programs.

Each of these takes more than an hour or two each week.

I have lay partners in leadership in these programs – and I treasure working with them! I meet with families who have a child about to receive Holy Communion and with those soon to be Confirmed. God's Word is our Source and Seed! Teaching is one of my joys!

Worship Planning is a weekly project... not just for the upcoming Sunday but also for future services that involve musicians, the band, members with special needs, or scheduling at a nursing home. My work on a sermon begins as I prepare for the Monday Morning Bible Study, but it continues all week – it is often my first hour of work each morning! I read related scriptures, commentaries, and posted notes from my colleagues and professors; the week culminates in writing and rewriting...usually on Fridays and Saturdays. Normally, that takes about 8-10 hours each week. Periods of time with special services (Lent and Holy Week) require even more time, as I try to be creative in presentation and content. Then, of course, when a member of the congregation dies, the schedule is rewritten completely, as that event will absorb between 10-15 hours, depending upon the circumstances.

Writing is a weekly chore – bulletin blurbs, advertisements, newspaper articles, and newsletter articles are needed to convey both information and make invitations to our members but also to invite others to join us. Posting invitations in public places like bulletin boards, elevators, and dropping them off to members who I think might need

the personal invite is also part of my week. Many of you could help in this area – writing, posting, and inviting others, too!

In addition to congregational committee meetings each week, there are meetings with other clergy and the Laurel Highlands Conference. Trinity is involved in many ways in

our community – and I am often the representative – both to have input and to keep informed. Our Somerset Area Ministries accomplishes a great deal together – and coordinating our work is important. Occasionally, I serve as a volunteer Chaplain at the Hospital, visiting patients without a church home, or calling their pastors about a hospitalization.

There are days when it seems I am on the phone all day – talking, texting, and emailing as well. I try to respond as quickly as possible to contacts, but



be aware, that if I don't have your number in my phone, I may not answer. My phone is a public number, and I get a lot of solicitations, requests for help, and "robo" calls. If you leave a message, I will return it as soon as I can. Occasionally there is a glitch, and I don't return a call – so please try me again if I haven't gotten back to you promptly! Texting is the best - brief, clear and quick! It is a privilege to walk with our members as they deal with a family or health crisis...we may visit only over the phone, but my being "present" can come in many different forms.

Once or twice a day and while I am waiting for an appointment or a visit to begin, I will check our Facebook page or our Website. Nicholas Carroll and I oversee the posts, look at the responses, and return messages and inquiries made by visitors to our social media sites. We try to advertise upcoming events, Bible Studies, and meetings. It is one form of communication that takes constant upkeep. I am also in prayer throughout my day – occasionally you may see me in the car in the parking lot...on a bench in the outdoor chapel...I pray on the road as well!

I am not as good as I would like to be with notes of thanks, condolence cards, or remembrances of anniversaries. Fortunately, our Care and Share Committee members do much of this work – so I can focus on visiting, preparing for funerals, baptisms, and marriages. Occasionally I get to help celebrate milestone anniversaries and birthdays, bless a new home, or visit with folks making transitions from their own home to nursing facilities. We share life's joys and sorrows together – it is in these holy moments that our faith is put to work, the Body of Christ is present in hospital consultations, holding a hand, wiping a tear, saying a prayer, or keeping silent vigil at bedside of the dying.

Part of my work is in the area of Administration – the word "Ad" "ministration" means enabling or making good things possible. I have partnerships with the church staff, the Child



Care staff, and the Lay Leadership of the congregation. Meeting with families, working through a problem, making decisions, making arrangements, responding to questions, hiring and overseeing staffing decisions, moving furniture, writing

reports, keeping records, setting up for meetings, and putting things away, baking bread, creating costumes, researching and inquiring with the Seminary and Synod – these are just a few things I do, to "ad-minister" the congregation's work. I enjoy my regular "chapel time" with the children of the Child Care and occasionally cover for a staff member that needs to step away from their work for an hour or two.

Hopefully, you have a better understanding of what your pastor is doing between Sunday mornings. But, I am quite serious about inviting you to join me on a day in ministry! I would love the company! Otherwise, join me in prayer for this ministry we do together! And if you have a question – please ask me!

AN EASTER MESSAGE

It all started with such promise – the angel announcing to Mary that the child she would bear would be called Son of the Most High; the conviction of Mary that this child would be the embodiment of God's promised justice, that the hungry would



promised justice, that the hungry would be filled with good things and the rich sent away empty; angels announcing his birth; thousands being fed; the sick healed; the dead raised. And then, "My God, my God, why have you for-

saken me?" It was over. The world hadn't changed. Might still made right. How ridiculously naïve to believe that any reversal of the old order could come about. Hope is for the gullible. Looking at this broken man hanging utterly helpless, naked and broken on a cross, the powers and principalities, earthly and spiritual, death and the devil must have said, "You fool."

This, as St. Paul reminds us, is the wisdom of the world. And the world can present plenty of hard evidence that it is right: children killing children in horrific school shootings, 60 million displaced people – all of this supported by our rebellion against God, our idolatrous claim that we are in control and the world is ours. In the face of this and all of the suffering others cause and we cause others, we too might cry out, "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?"

I believe that the beginning of Psalm 22 expresses the anguish of the psalmist and the anguish of our Lord, but there is more going on here. Citing the first words of a text was, in the tradition of the time, a way of identifying an entire passage. The psalm ends this way: "All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord; and all the families of the nations shall worship before him. ...Posterity will serve him; future generations will be told about the Lord, and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn, saying that he has done it." This is the wisdom of God.

Jesus' crucifixion is the death of our death. His innocent suffering has reconciled all of creation to God. He has done it. We stake our lives on this. This year, Easter fell on April 1. We shall have come through the Lenten desert to the Easter garden. We shall say, "Christ is risen. He is risen indeed. Alleluia!" And we shall confess this and live this in the face of worldly wisdom that is based on death. Life wins. Love wins. And if the world wants to call us April fools, we are glad to claim that title.

A VIEW FROM THE LOFT

Beethoven's Sacred Music

I recently shared with the Adult Sunday School a class on Beethoven's oratorio, *Christus am Ölberge – Christ on the Mount of Olives*. The work is a dramatic oratorio rather than a religious choral Mass or a dramatic opera and is considered a much more humanistic portrayal of the Christ passion than other settings, such as those by Bach. It concludes at the point of Jesus personally accepting his fate, placing the emphasis on his own decision rather than the later Crucifixion or Resurrection. Beethoven, though not usually thought of as a sacred composer, made a big impact during his life with Christus. It is significant to point out that Beethoven was already going deaf at the time he was composing this oratorio, and many speculate he identified with Christ's suf-

fering because of this reason. Though it is not often performed today, this work had a far reaching influence on other composers including Andrew Lloyd Webber whose own musical, "Jesus Christ Superstar" takes a lot



of influence from Beethoven in that it focuses on Christ's personal suffering and feelings during Holy Week.

A second significant sacred work of Beethoven is *Missa Solemnis—Solemn Mass*. This piece was commissioned by an archbishop for his coronation ceremony. Beethoven did not finish it for a long time, and it ended being so musically involved that it was never performed during a church service, but has instead been solely performed in concert halls. Like most masses, Beethoven's *Missa Solemnis* is in five movements: Kyrie, Gloria, Credo, Sanctus, and Agnus Dei. A typical performance of the complete work runs 80 to 85 minutes. The difficulty of the piece combined with the requirements for a full orchestra, large chorus, and highly trained soloists, both vocal and instrumental, mean that it is not often performed by amateur or even semi-professional ensembles.

Missa Solemnis along with Handel's *Messiah,* and Haydn's *The Creation* is considered possibly the greatest work of sacred music. British Musicologist Sir Donald Tovey said, "Not even Bach or Handel can show a greater sense of space



and of sonority. There is no earlier choral writing that comes so near to recovering some of the lost secrets or a more thrilling sense of the individual colour of every chord, every position, and every doubled third or discord."

For many, probably Beethoven's most significant sacred work is the *Finale from the 9th Symphony*, the melody of which is used in the famous hymn, *Joyful, Joyful We Adore Thee*. The original lyrics when translated also have a very sacred text. Beethoven's lyrics were largely inspired by the poem by Friedrich Schiller. Below is the ending stanza:

You millions, I embrace you. This kiss is for all the world!

Brothers, above the starry canopy There must dwell a loving Father.

Do you fall in worship, you millions? World, do you know your creator?

Seek him in the heavens; Above the stars must He dwell.

"Declaration on the Way" Lutheran-Roman Catholic Dialogues

> Saturday, May 5, 2018 9:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

One of the key scripture stories of the Easter season is Jesus' appearance to the two who were "on the road" to Emmaus (Luke 24:13-35). As they walked, a stranger joined them, asked about the news, and they explained that they had hoped that Jesus was the Messiah, but that he had been put to death. Further, the two had heard the reports from some women about the empty tomb, and could hardly believe it might be true that Jesus was alive. The stranger began to tell them about the Holy Scriptures that described how the Messiah would die and would rise from the dead... and yet, they did not know that it was Jesus walking with them! They invite the stranger to their home and they share a meal. In the "breaking of the bread" it was revealed to them that the stranger was, in fact, Jesus! Later, they realize that he had been revealing to them the meaning of the scriptures... and their "hearts had been burning" while he did so.

I love this image... that two of his followers don't even realize Jesus is with them, teaching them, and it was in the breaking of bread, the fellowship over a meal, that they realized he had been with them all the time! Jesus comes among us when we struggle with our faith, expectations, and our search for meaning. Jesus comes among us in the breaking of bread and fellowship – and Jesus is revealing himself in these encounters!

I hope YOU will join us for Lay School this May 5th! We will be exploring the changes in our faith relationships with our Roman

Catholic brothers and sisters. We will enjoy fellowship and breaking bread together – and in doing so, experience Jesus and the Body of Christ, the Church, in a new way. Come with questions! Come with your experiences! Invite a Roman Catholic friend – and Come!

We have two excellent speakers: Dr. Maria Erling (Gettysburg, United Lutheran Seminary) and Monsignor Michael Becker (Roman Catholic priest and Ecumenical Officer for the Altoona-Johnstown Diocese.)



WHAT IS THE MUTUAL MINISTRY COMMITTEE?

"Mutual Ministry is a mission-oriented enterprise that is characterized by a broad vision of ministry and a healthy practice of mutuality."*

The members of the Mutual Ministry Committee, along with the Pastor, are to attend to the Mission orientation of the congregation – the emphasis is on how the Congregation and the Pastor work together to meet the challenges and accomplish our Mission.

Trinity's Mission is to be people of God in Christ.

How we work to accomplish that mission is detailed in our Vision Statement:

The Vision of Trinity Evangelical Lutheran Church is to be thankful people of God anchored in the Gospel. We grow through worship, study, Christian fellowship, service, and sharing God's love with all creation.

Mutual Ministry is in the name – how do we accomplish this together? That is an ongoing pursuit and changes with the joys, sorrows, and challenges the congregation faces. When there is stress or anxiety, it is easy for people to resort to unhealthy behaviors. Changes in finances, staffing, attendance, programming, culture, or generational shifts are all stressors.

The Mutual Ministry Committee works to monitor changes in the congregation, anticipate challenges, and works with other leadership to creatively meet them in healthy ways. To clarify:

• The Committee is not intended to "minister to the pastor" by taking care of the Pastor's personal needs for psychological or spiritual support. Rather, the committee is to work in partnership with the Pastor to deal with the challenges the congregation faces and to think creatively about how to approach the mission.

• The Committee is not a way to channel complaints about the pastor, anonymously. This is ineffective and can be a harmful approach to dealing with conflict. Rather, committee members are to help members "own" their issues and deal directly with the Pastor if there is a problem. Therefore, we do not use each other to "triangle" communications.

• The persons on the Committee are appointed by the Council – not typically volunteers – for their maturity, wisdom, and concern for the overall health of the congregation.

I look forward to a healthy *Mutual Ministry* with my partners: John Cascio, Gretchen Knupp, Donna Jacobson, George Kaufman, Bill Carroll and Dale Kriner.

As 2017 ends and we look head to 2018, I thank you for your commitment to ELCA Global Mission in Kenya. I am grateful that I serve here with you and by means of your generous financial support. Know of my heartfelt thanks and my hope that you will continue this journey in mission in 2018. We are stronger when we are together. I thank you.

This is what the Kingdom of God looks like, in part, at Nairobi International Lutheran Congregation. We have a highly valued Friday afternoon self-help support group that are "positive," that is HIV/AIDS positive, and they find strength and support under the leadership of one of our congregational members, Christine Wamathai each week. A common practice here is financial support groups in which members contribute on a regular basis and then, when a certain figure is reached, they are able to take a loan for a child's school fees, or family medical expenses, and the like. At the year-end gathering, Christine went through each member's 2017 account and distributed

their balances. The average amount received was around 4,000 Kenyan shillings, about US \$40. One member spoke of taking her grandchild on a trip while another said she'd try not to spend it on



Christmas gifts so she'd have some reserve going into the new year.

At a recent meeting, we spoke of Jesus' mother, Mary, who gave birth under difficult conditions, far from her family, in a humble setting. Several group members then spoke of the challenges they face trying to care for their children and grandchildren under hard conditions of illness and poverty. I receive a hundredfold back from what I provide them. We sang and we smiled, then held hands in a circle of prayer as we gave thanks that, like Mary, we find favor with God when we bear Christ's love to the world.

SAFETY AND SECURITY

A Task Group has been formed to complete a 'security audit' for Trinity's property and programming. Working with Police Chief Randy Cox and other resources, the Task Group will be developing a series of recommendations to improve safety and security for the people who attend functions at Trinity. Please be patient, as a few of our practices may change as we become more aware of ways we can Improve safety. As Chief Cox reminded the Task Group recently, we want to increase safety, but be mindful that increasing security measures ought not to compromise our hospitality and our mission!

The first change may come as early as the beginning of May if the Council approves. Historically, all the doors to the church buildings have normally remained open throughout Sunday mornings. This means that during worship, persons may enter and exit without being seen or greeted. In an effort to reduce this possibility, the recommendation is that, with the exception of the front doors and the handicapped entrance of the sanctuary building, the other doors of the church buildings may be locked after the 10:00 worship service begins in the Nave (with the exception of the front door and handicapped door of the sanctuary building). In this way, the ushers will know who is entering the building and be able to greet them.

ALL OF TRINITY'S DOORS ARE EMERGENCY EXIT DOORS

– anyone can always exit the building through any door. The only exceptions are the front door and the handicapped entrance – both of which will remain unlocked. This change will only limit access into the buildings after worship begins. Please be mindful of this if you are running late or need to go out to your car – entrance will be limited to the front doors of the church after worship begins. We are recommending and hope to have signage added by that time, to "shepherd" people to the front door.

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
