#### FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

This life therefore is not righteousness, but growth in righteousness; not health, but healing; not being but becoming; not rest but exercise. We are not yet what we shall be, but we are growing toward it; the process is not yet finished, but it is going on; this is not the end, but it is the road. All does not yet gleam in glory, but all is being purified. -- Martin Luther

As we enter into the fall of the year...a new year begins in our public school systems, children are gathered for Sunday School, and folks who have been away many weekends in the summer are (hopefully!) back in their pews. We return to what we call the "normal" schedule. It is a fitting time to talk about how we "grow in righteousness" - as individual disciples and as a community in Christ.

St. Paul uses this "growing" analogy in Colossians 2:6-7: "Therefore, just as you have received Christ Jesus as Lord, continue to walk in him, rooted and built up in Him established in the faith as you were taught, and overflowing with thankfulness."

First, in our Baptism, we are "planted" in a community in Christ – a congregation. At every Baptism, we ask parents and sponsors to bring their children to



worship and the table of Grace; to place in their hands the Holy Scriptures; to teach them the Creed and the Lord's Prayer...our early growth takes place in the home and IF parents fulfill their promises, in the church community as well. The Church helps by providing opportunities through worship, children's messages, Sunday School, Vacation Bible School, and family events. God gives the growth!

We grow in righteousness as we become more deeply rooted in God's Word and Promises, as we begin to put those teachings into our daily practice. We grow in faith as we learn to take responsibility for our own growth in faith, by daily prayer and devotions, as we attend Confirmation and learn the deeper truths about faith and doubt, sin and forgiveness, self-giving love and thankfulness.

This summer, I have been using a book by Mark Tidsworth, for my own prayer, study, and as a tool to think about our life together as Church. Farming Church: Cultivating Adaptive Change in Congregations suggests that God's people grow in an environment that is cultivated



for growth in Faith. Just as a farmer or gardener must pay attention to key characteristics in the environment, before planting, so too...God's People can cultivate a good growing environment for growth in Faith!

Some of the key cultivation characteristics are: Faith, Trust, Vision, Leadership, Urgency, Discovery, and Alignment. Every congregation, just like every plot of ground, has characteristics that are unique: history, experiences, obstacles, challenges, and joys.

As we move into the fall of a new school year, and approach planning for the future, keep your congregation in prayer. Pray for and support our leadership, by showing up, by volunteering where there is a need, offer to help where you are gifted, and give generously with Thanksgivng! If you think we are "missing something" in our cultivation of Faith speak to me, or another member of our Leadership. God gives us everything we need to grow in faith and love... Let's grow together!

### 2019 ELCA CHURCHWIDE ASSEMBLY - MILWAUKEE AUGUST 5-10, 2019

Our denomination, the ELCA, holds a churchwide assembly triennially to worship, vote on matters of governance and policy, and be church together for the sake of the world. This past week's churchwide assembly was full of important votes and actions including:

- Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton was reelected for a second six-year term on the first ballot.
- A declaration of apology to our siblings of African descent, which was received by the African Descent Lutheran Association with thanks and a call for accountability and living into the words shared.
- Approved resolution declaring the ELCA is a "sanctuary church body," encouraging participation in the ELCA AMMPARO initiative for migrant children, discernment of care for our immigrant neighbors in our context, and the promise of forthcoming resources for this work.
- Approved support for the World Council of Church's *Thursdays in Black*, awareness movement for a world without rape and violence.
- Voted to commemorate June 17 as a day of repentance, in honor and remembrance of the martyrdom of the Emanuel 9.
- Approved a declaration for inter-religious commitment, reaffirming ecumenical and interfaith partnerships.
- Approved the recommendations from a strategic taskforce which has been studying how to work toward authentic diversity in our church.
- Approved memorials: affirming but not "endorsing" the Poor People's Campaign, care for immigrants and refugees, and other statements.
- Adopted a new social statement, "Faith, Sexism, and Justice: a Lutheran Call to Action," and its implementing resolutions.
- Deacon Sue Rothmeyer was elected Churchwide Secretary, a fulltime position which acts as executive administrator and leader on all constitutional matters and interpretation.
- Constitutional change for Deacons (rostered ministers of word and service) to be ordained, from the previous practice of consecration.
- Celebrated the milestones of 50 years of women's ordination, 40 years since the first woman of color was ordained, and 10 years since full inclusion of LGBTQIA+ clergy.

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#### WHAT DOES THIS MEAN?

You may recognize this statement from Luther's Catechism...it is appropriate to ask that question today, as well. Our Churchwide Assembly makes decisions on resolutions, approves budgets, and affirms relationships in our ministry with the wider church and engagement with the issues of this world. Some of the affirmations and statements will need to be further explored and explained. The decision to Affirm that the ELCA is a Sanctuary Church is in keeping with our long history of being a denomination that came with immigrants, to the American shores, searching for new opportunity and freedoms. But what does it mean to be a Sanctuary Church? These are some things you should know:

<sup>+</sup>The scriptures time and again challenge the people of God to welcome the stranger and alien in their land. To be a people of hospitality and welcome, knowing that "once we were not a people, but now we are God's own people" by the grace of God through Jesus Christ. This is a Biblical principle.

†The majority of members of ELCA congregations, with the notable exceptions of first nations peoples and those whose ancestors were brought here as slaves against their will, can trace their roots to immigrants who sought a new life, here. In the wake of WWII, when 1 in 6 refugees in the world were Lutherans, Lutherans in the United States started Lutheran Immigration and Refugee Service (LIRS) www.lirs.org. Lutherans have worked with immigrants and refugees, from our earliest expressions of church and community... and it is a way in which we practice our faith in the world today.

†In 2016 the ELCA Churchwide Assembly committed to walking alongside Central American children and families fleeing their communities by passing the AMMPARO strategy (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation, and Opportunities). Through the AMMPARO Strategy, we support organizations and faith communities that work with deported migrants in Central America and advocate for a humane treatment of immigrants in Mexico. In this way we support and improve the lives in individuals in their home countries so they do not need to make the dangerous journey north.

†By stating it is a sanctuary denomination, the ELCA Churchwide Assembly is publicly declaring we walk alongside immigrants and refugees as a matter of faith. Our governing body declared that when we preach on Sunday that Jesus told us to welcome the vulnerable, the stranger, the children we will use our hands and voices to make sure it happens.

†The Churchwide action in no way obligates the property or resources of any congregation or church institution. Each synod, congregation, and agency will discern what being a sanctuary church means for them, in their setting. Some of our churches are already actively involved in providing help to immigrants and refugees. Trinity is engaged in this work in several ways -- this is an affirmation of our ministry.

†Sanctuary work can take a number of forms, which many of our congregations are already doing. The most important is that we are willing to have the challenging conversations about immigration policy in a way that leads to advocacy for bi-partisan action by our leadership to resolve the Refugee Crisis.

<sup>†</sup>Being a sanctuary denomination means that as a church, we want to be public and vocal about this work and the need for humane reform to our immigration system. Welcoming people IS political - because it is about *people*. But it is not a partisan issue, it is a matter of faith – putting our professed faith in Jesus, who crossed boundaries to embrace those who suffer - into action. Join us for conversation in the Adult Sunday Class at 8:45 a.m. Class is held in Adult III OR in the Fellowship Hall.

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### SO WELL SAID!

#### From Fred Abraham

We occasionally hear someone assert the United States is a Christian Nation. Unfortunately for them that is not only inaccurate but specifically prohibited by the first amendment to the Constitution: "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof." However, it is probably true we are a nation of Christians. In 2015, 75% of adult Americans identified themselves as Christians, by far the majority religion. Nonetheless, Christianity is not the official religion. We don't have one.

Given the large majority of Americans who claim to follow the teachings of Jesus of Nazareth, it seems puzzling so many non-Christian acts are committed and even condoned. Take the situation at our southern border: 45,000 immigrant children have been separated from their families in the last 6 months. Held in detention centers under deplorable conditions, these children will be scarred for life. Some have even died.

This is a catastrophe of our own making. There are any number of things we could do to improve the situation, but we have failed miserably both as a nation and as individuals. How can professed Christians accept what is going on?

I heard an excellent sermon by a church pastor pointing

out there is nothing, nothing at all in Christian teachings that justifies what we are doing. Where is the Christian outrage he asked? He was not being politically partisan but religiously partisan. Shouldn't we expect



Christians to stand and fight for the saving of these children?

It was refreshing to hear such strong words from the pulpit, and they need to be said. Clerics of all faiths, but especially those of the majority religion, have a responsibility to provide leadership not only on immigration issues but on those issues that define what our country should be and how believers should act. I am not talking about taking sides in the bitter political struggle we are currently undergoing. Rather, it is the obligation of all Christian leaders to make clear what is right and what is wrong about what our country is doing and what individuals and Christians should be doing about it.

There is a danger in assuming this role. Congregation members may be offended, openly critical, and ultimately leave the church. That is certainly unfortunate but that may be the price to pay for this kind of much needed leadership. I think far too many clerics have remained silent or muted on what is happening in our society out of fear of personal criticism. That is certainly understandable. Nobody wants to feel like a failure at their calling or possibly even lose a job.

Nonetheless, I call upon all clerics but especially those of the Christian faith in our nation of Christians, to stand up and speak for the poor, underprivileged, and downtrodden among us. They should urge their follow-



ers to live and practice their professed beliefs. Is there a personal risk in doing this? Of course. But, I know of one person in history who did this successfully at great personal sacrifice. Shouldn't we try to continue his courageous acts?

Do not be afraid. I am with you. I will help you. I have called you by name. You are my beloved child. Come as you are and know that I am God. I will never leave you or forsake you. - God

What a pleasure and privilege to have attended the Churchwide Assembly as a representative of our Allegheny Synod. I must admit that at first I was a little nervous taking on this responsibility. But there comes a time when you cannot keep dodging the Holy Spirit!!

I witnessed great, profound preaching and a call to radical love was in the air. We could not deny that the Holy Spirit was present. From dialogue, to amendments, to resolutions, and even "on the spot" apologies were witnessed. God is on the move!!

What does a radical welcome look like for those who are "religious wanderers"? - Those who are searching for God. We as Lutherans are called to welcome those who are searching, in the name of Christ. Do we have enough Love to make a radical welcome *genuine*?

In Acts 8:26-39, Philip meets an Ethiopian Eunich. This man is an icon for how radical God's Love can be. He is of another race, culture, and sexual identity. Philip made space for the Ethiopian to lead the conversation about the Messiah as well as Baptism. Who can dictate who God will use to

challenge the boundaries of our tradition? Christians tend to draw circles around ourselves and God removes them. Lutherans are called by Christ to be examples of his radical welcome. We are received by grace and by grace we receive our neighbors - it is not negotiable but fundamental!

I grew up as a religious wanderer...my family of origin had moved from church to church, looking for a welcome. At 17, thanks be to God, I was welcomed by the people of Good Shepherd Lutheran Church! Since that time, I have been welcomed here at Trinity - and I have been given space to grow, through Marys and Marthas, Table Talk, Monday Morning Bible Study, and through Bridges of Hope - our Hispanic outreach, which has expanded our community.

Let's not second guess our witness! Thank you for taking a risk for the Gospel! With every barrier that is broken down, we can use what is left to build a stronger church where all are welcome!

When we sing the hymn with the refrain, "Here I Am, Lord" - God challenges us to step out of our comfort zones and turn to those who are waiting for God's radical love and our radical welcome.



This experience was heartfelt and life changing for me. As we walk with Christ together, I hope we can be loving enough to each other to say "No" when it's needed (to racism, sexism, etc.) and "Yes" when the Holy Spirit calls us!

#### VIEW FROM THE LOFT

#### Being the Purple Church

We all know that our country is divided. We base our beliefs on what others tell us and try our best to fit ourselves within two extreme ideologies, each equally guilty of telling us there is only room for us to belong if we prescribe to their position completely. In my own lifetime, I remember a time when it was not assumed a person held a certain belief simply by being blue or red, but now it is almost a guarantee. The ELCA has put out a podcast called "The Three Sides," emphasizing that to every argument there are two sides...and then there is God's side, the third side. As a church, we are called to BE that third side. We are called to reject the rest of our country's trend of fitting our religion into red or blue; we are called to be the purple church. The question, of course, is how in the world can we be purple? How can we be purple, especially when sometimes scripture points us in a way one side or the other may not like?

In my view this leads us back to an essential element of Lutheranism that seems lost in all the noise of the world. It is a distinctly Lutheran gift given to us in the Small Catechism. This came to my attention as I was reading a recent Augsburg Fortress publication called, <u>by heart</u>. The book is an amazing resource that recounts the history of the Small Catechism and provides it with beautiful new pictures and illustrations. As I was rereading the Small Catechism, Luther's description of the 8<sup>th</sup> commandment jumped out at me:

#### You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor.



#### What Is This? or What Does This Mean?

We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray or slander them, or destroy their reputations. Instead we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything they do in the best possible light.

Wow! Read that again: we are to "*interpret everything they do in the best possible light.*" Imagine that! I literally cannot think of this occurring in our world today. Everyone is so convinced that they are right and feel that the motives of others, the intent, is no longer relevant. This statement of Luther's is such an incredible treasure of love, and we have squandered it. We have failed to do it amongst ourselves let alone in the outside world. For me this is the essential missing piece we need to be the purple church, and the amazing thing is, God is so gracious that we already have it.

Let us pray together. Sing together. With one voice. When some are disillusioned by scripture readings and where they lead us, we can model to the world what it's like to interpret each other in the best possible light. Of course, this is not news. Jesus tells us to love God and to love our neighbors as ourselves, and of course, this includes interpreting each other in the best possible light, just as we wish for others to see our good intentions. I once heard a Pastor describe our theology as buried treasure - that we already have been given everything we need, but we hoard it when we need to spend it. Instead of writing each other off as too different in opinion or politics, we need to look at the intent. If we all do this to each other there really is no risk. Love is scary only when it's one sided, but as I already pointed out, there is a third side, God's side, and THAT side will always choose love.
