FROM THE PASTOR'S HEART

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ,

On my list of things to do during Holy Week, an Easter Egg Hunt has never been at the top. Then this year, due to several valid reasons and extenuating circumstances, our Easter Egg Hunt had to be cancelled.

Shortly after the decision was communicated to our families, I read an article reprinted below written by Father Christopher O'Donnell from the Order of Carmelites, of the Roman Catholic Church. What Is Resurrection? An Easter Reflection

Why are eggs associated with Easter? Why are they such a powerful symbol of resurrection? The word needs some care. It is not resuscitation, as if Jesus were simply brought back to life, like Lazarus or the widow's son at Nain (see John 9 and Luke 7:11-15). Resurrection is transformation. The symbols of resurrection are many.

So then, why eggs and Easter? An egg is totally changed.

What is yellow and white liquid becomes alive with feathers and a chirp. If you look at the liquid of eggs alone, you would never tell what they would become. A liquid goo becomes a chicken – a sea gull, crow or magpie. Another Easter symbol is the seed, or acorn. You can look at a seed and never imagine what color it may turn

out to have. Similarly, with a caterpillar and butterfly. These are resurrection symbols because they become something else, totally unforeseen and beautiful. And yet there is continuity: the egg becomes a chicken; an acorn becomes an oak-tree; a caterpillar becomes a butterfly.

There are also human resurrection symbols: persons recovering from drug addiction or alcoholism become what they have despaired of happening. They are the same persons, but now transformed; they have new life, new hopes, and new possibilities. Another resurrection symbol might be a teenager becoming an adult: he or she is the same, but different with the new beauties of maturity.



The resurrection is an invitation to look around to see transformation, to see what is evil being changed, what is immature becoming adult; what appears inert like an egg or seed sprouting life.

But for the Christian, the resurrection has a still richer meaning. St. Paul, clearly repeating a catechetical formula that he had learned, says to the Corinthians: *I handed on to you as of first importance what I in turn had received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the scriptures and that he was buried, and that he was raised on the third day according to the scriptures (1Corinthians 15:3-4).* We can tease out this text by looking at accounts of the resurrection. They are quite subtle. The first thing we can see is that Jesus "was raised on the third day." Who raised him? The Father by the power of the Holy Spirit (*see Romans 1:3-4; 8:11*). When we look at the resurrection appearances, we notice that Jesus is not at first recognized by those who loved him and who were his close associates or disciples. The exception seems to be the Beloved Disciple who had special insight (*see John 20:8; 21:7*). The others come to faith; indeed, faith was necessary to identify Jesus. The Risen Jesus is then the same but different. This can be put in another way by saying that Jesus is not resuscitated but is resurrected.

Christ is risen and has promised to take us with him. This life is not the end; we too will be transformed in endless life and beauty. Human life is good, but it will end. The resurrection gives hope and meaning to our existence here. In our weakness we will after death be raised in glory. Again, there is continuity: it is I (not just my body) that I hope will be raised. As Paul writes:

> So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable, what is raised is imperishable. It is sown in dishonor, it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness, it is raised in power. It is sown a physical body, it is raised a spiritual body. 1Corinthians 15:42-44

Dear Sisters and Brothers of Trinity Lutheran Church,

Thank you for sharing in Christ's Ministry at Trinity Lutheran Church. We want you to know that we are really glad that you are a part of the worshipping body of Christ here, in this time and place, and in the life of God's people.

The purpose of this letter is two-fold.

First, it is the final Trinity Lutheran Church Income and Expense Report for 2022. In short, 2022 expenses exceeded 2022 income by \$108,054.

How did we cover the shortfall? By spending some of the money which had accumulated over several years in our short-term savings and trust accounts. As explained in the administrative documents of the Trinity Endowment Fund, endowment monies were not *(and cannot be)* used to cover budget shortfalls.

Throughout 2022 our Finance Committee and Church Council members carefully managed and monitored the church budget on a weekly basis while making studied, proactive decisions to insure the continued viability of Trinity ministries and programs. On behalf of the congregation, they have responded to a wide variety of issues:

- In-person and online worship attendance have been steadily climbing. We now have three regular worship services each Sunday (8 am, 10 am, and 5 pm). We received new members twice during 2022 and will soon receive another group into membership.
- The increased presence of children and youth in Sunday School and worship contributes to the vitality of our church family. Summer program plans are underway and we are looking forward to the excitement of a wider variety of fellowship activities for all ages.

- Combined income in 2022 was flat as compared to most recent years. This is especially concerning considering that while we received covid-related grants specific to our Child Care ministry, Sunday offerings were down.
- Trinity's Child Care ministry is a ministry of the congregation serving families of the Somerset community. Unlike the Food Pantry, which is a separately incorporated organization for which Trinity provides a home, our Child Care Ministry is totally owned and operated as part of Trinity's overall ministry.

The budget of our Child Care Ministry is sizable compared to other ministries of the congregation, however, largely due to the cost of its specially trained, licensed and/or certified staff. Due to an extremely tight labor market for qualified Child Care Workers in 2022 and our inability to hire/keep qualified staff, the Child Care Committee, Finance Committee, and Church Council made the proactive decision to increase our starting pay scale for all Child Care staff, which enabled 72 children to continue to be cared for in our safe and loving environment. Thanks to grants and financial support by church members, our Child Care ministry ran a positive cash flow for 2022.

A graph on the next page provides a series of snapshots comparing annual budgets and worship attendance for 2019-2022.

The second purpose of this letter is to **thank you** for your continued, consistent, and sacrificial giving.

If you are not currently giving to Trinity, we invite you to give and thereby provide essential support for our congregation's ministries. There are lots of reasons that people give offerings to Trinity. Many want to support Trinity's awe-inspiring Children's, Youth and Child Care ministries. Some want to support the work of our Care and Share efforts or the cost of pastoral support for brothers and sisters in Christ who are going through difficult times. Others want to support our Worship and Music Ministry or our Grief Support Program. Others want to support Christian Fellowship and Community Outreach events.

Most importantly, giving is an important part of our growing in our faith.

We believe that everything we have comes from God and when we give we are returning just a small portion of what God has first given us. When we give we remember that our God is a god of abundance and that when we give our offering back to God, we are showing trust – trust that God will always provide, trust that God is always with us, Page 8

and trust that there will always be enough. We invite you to join us and other Trinity households in giving. Give to support Trinity's work. Give to grow in your faith.

A VIEW FROM THE LOFT

Joy Is Ours

After Easter Sunday and during the season of Easter, we will be using a new musical liturgy I composed entitled, "Joy Is Ours." In our modern times of globally declining church attendance, it is my firm belief that the church still matters. In a sermon, ELCA Pastor Nadia Bolz-Weber stated her belief that Christianity still matters because, "We have a better story than the world's." I believe one of the messages most needed from the church today is defiant joy-not mere happiness or platitudes, but a deep resounding joy that coexists with the pain and the suffering that so undeniably dominate in our world. I find joy throughout scripture. This same joy is what Jesus spoke of in Matthew 6:25-34, and it is what begins the Gospel of John. This is a defiant joy that shines in the darkness. These musical pieces form a liturgy to which I sincerely believe and fervently hope communicates that joy in every worship service it is used. May it be a blessing to you to hear and sing as it has been a blessing for me to compose. A recording of the liturgy is available on the church website under "music" and "2023" Choirs" for those who wish to listen and learn ahead. To aid in the appreciation of the work and to communicate my thought process, I want to share each piece and some commentary on each.

1. Kyrie: "Lord, Have Mercy"

Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy, we lack faith in you. Lord, have mercy. Lord, have mercy, we lack trust in you. But we remember you're slow to anger, abounding in steadfast love. Grant us strength to share your grace with all people of the world.

Although, some people may find it difficult to sing "we lack faith in you" and "we lack trust in you," it is indeed the place of a Kyrie to serve as a musical confession to God. There

are many instances of lack of faith and trust throughout scripture, and we should not presume we are any different. Much of our fear-based sin is rooted in a lack of faith and trust, believing there is only "so much to go around." The stark tone of the first two lines quickly transition to the scriptural reminder that God is "slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love" (Psalm 103:8). As Pastor Ruth recently pointed out in a sermon, much of the world knows Christians for what they are against rather than what they are for. The last line of this song asks that the Holy Spirit fill us and strengthen us to break this cycle and show the world that the Good News of Jesus Christ is for all people (Luke 2:10-11). Much of what we hear from Christianity today is not new, *good*, or for all.

2. Canticle of Praise: "Worry Not"

Gloria, gloria, glory to God alone. Gloria, gloria, glory to God alone. Worry not about tomorrow, there's trouble enough for today.

Our mouths are filled with laughter; Our tongues with shouts of joy!

Lord, you dress the flowers of the earth; In rainbow raiment, chromatic splendor.

You give song and food to the birds, And for us a love too deep for words.

While we are sinners you give us your Son, To walk with us in the trials that we face Blessed with your broken body and blood, And uplifted by your boundless grace.

Clap your hands all you people of God! Filled with the Spirit of all creation, Compassion to mourn; hope to endure, Faith, burn within us to join in the song!

One of my very favorite and "go to" parts of scripture is Jesus's reminder not to worry in Matthew 6:25 and onward. I can think of no better verse to base a song of praise and joy on. Musically, I wanted to write a piece in the style of Handel, as I believe his music permeates joy.

3. Gospel Acclamation: "The Word Was God"

In the beginning was the Word, And the Word was with God, And the Word WAS God. And the light was the life of all people, Let all who have ears, listen! The light of Christ shines in the darkness And the darkness does not overcome it.

The beginning of the Gospel of John, for me, is the foundational summation of Christian theology. When we read from the Bible, the word of God, many forget that the Bible tells us that the Word *is* God, that is not just the Bible, but God, Christ, Spirit, the entire Trinity itself. I think this scripture passage is an important reminder to sing before we hear our weekly Gospel reading.

4. Sanctus: "God of Now"

Holy God, Alpha and Omega; the beginning and the end Creator, Savior, Advocate, to you on our knees we bend. Come in mysterious presence!

In bread and wine your hands reach down.

God not only of past and future; Our God is the God of now. Our God is the God of now.

Before we receive the Sacrament of Holy Communion, we prepare our hearts and minds with a Eucharistic Prayer and sometimes a Sanctus that we sing. I wanted this Sanctus to sound joyful and also to remind us that God is truly with us... now!

5. Agnus Dei: "Gathered In Your Arms"

Gathered in your arms, O, Mother God We know respite, joy, now under your wings. When we are lost, you seek us out. Everyone of your lost sheep. You replace our tears with dancing, Choose a cross instead of judging, Lord, you take away the sin of the world. In our nights of doubt and sorrow You stand weeping with us always. Lord, you take away the sin of the world. Gathered in your arms O, God.

An agnus dei, often "Lamb of God", is sung after Communion to remind us that it is Jesus that takes away the sin of the world and that grace is not something we do for ourselves. I used the comforting imagery of Matthew 23:27 and focused on the parable of the lost sheep (Matthew 18) to incorporate more animal metaphors. I wanted the words to depict concretely what Christ does for us, searching us out, and weeping alongside us (John 11:35). Joy is not mere happiness but hope through pain and sorrow (Galatians 5:22) and so I wanted to be sure to include that aspect of life in this piece.


